Over eighty percent of Australia's population lives within 50 kilometres of the coast. With this in mind, it's important that we learn about our coast, so we can also look after it!


We have over 12,500 kilometres of coastline in Western Australia to explore, with almost half our coastline made up of sandy beaches. Other areas along our coast include rocky shores, estuaries, mangroves, mud flats and sand flats.

When exploring our coastline, it's always important to be prepared so you can make the most of your beachcombing experience.

Here are a few helpful tips:

- Wear sun protective clothing, including a hat and sunscreen.
- Take a bottle of water it can get hot out in the sun!
- Take a hand lens or magnifying glass for closer inspection.

- Be careful when picking items up you never know what could be hiding inside, or what might sting you!
- Help the environment and take any rubbish safely home with you – recycle or place it in the bin.
- Take your camera to help you to capture memories of your finds.
